

Proposed Crossrail 2 service patterns

Crossrail 2 is a proposed new railway which would run underground through central London, in a new tunnel between Wimbledon in the southwest, and Tottenham Hale and New Southgate in the north. Crossrail 2 services would also run on the existing National Rail network outside of the tunnelled section, serving outer London, Surrey and Hertfordshire.

During a typical weekday peak period, Crossrail 2 would provide up to 30 trains per hour in each direction through the tunnel underneath central London. It would also provide new through-services and interchange opportunities at major rail termini such as Euston, St Pancras and Victoria, connecting passengers directly with National Rail, High Speed 2 and Thameslink services, meaning passengers will be one change away from hundreds of destinations nationwide. Crossrail 2 would also connect directly with Crossrail 1 at Tottenham Court Road.

Crossrail 2 north of Dalston Junction:

Trains would serve two branches north of Dalston Junction. The first would be on a new tunnelled link via Seven Sisters to New Southgate, the second on the existing West Anglia Main Line tracks north of Tottenham Hale to Broxbourne. The stations on these branches could benefit from up to 12 Crossrail 2 trains per hour in each direction.

Crossrail 2 would require the addition of more tracks north of Tottenham Hale to create extra capacity for the new services to run. This would allow for a National Rail service of four trains per hour between all stations south of Cheshunt to Stratford as well as an increase in the number of faster longer-distance services between places such as Cambridge, Stansted and Liverpool Street.

Crossrail 2 south west of Wimbledon:

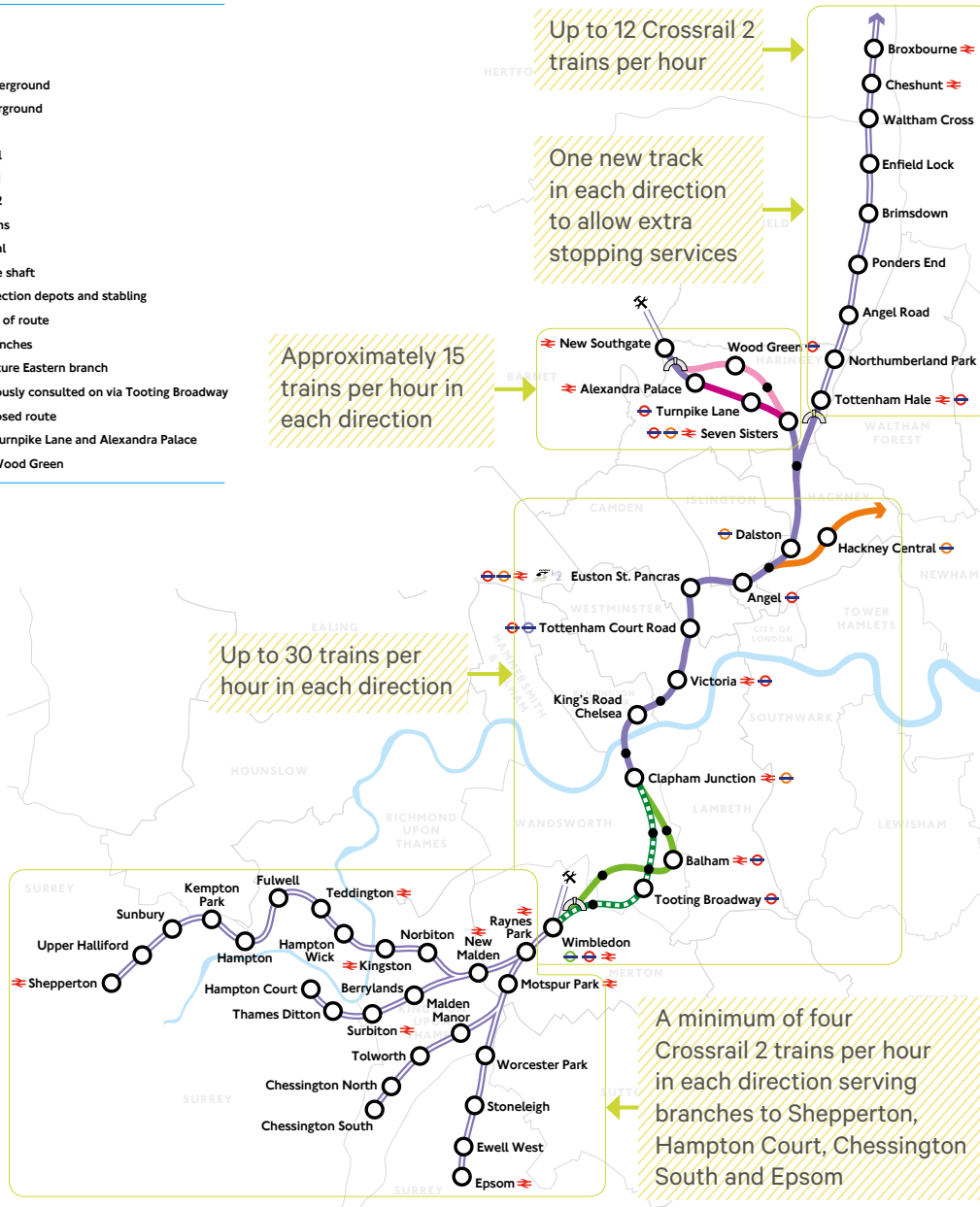
With 30 trains per hour through the tunnelled section, some Crossrail 2 services would terminate at Wimbledon before returning north. Up to 20 Crossrail 2 trains per hour will continue beyond Wimbledon to serve the four existing National Rail lines to Shepperton, Hampton Court, Chessington South and Epsom, with a minimum of four Crossrail 2 trains per hour on each line at all times of operation.

All four lines would see an increase in frequency of trains to central London. Part of the next stage of work is to identify how best to rebalance service provision to Waterloo, and where to provide simple interchange capability between Crossrail 2 and Waterloo services.

Crossrail 2 would connect to the National Rail network south west of Wimbledon, requiring the addition of new tracks on the South West Main Line to New Malden. This extra capacity for Crossrail 2 and suburban services would free space on the existing track, which could be reallocated to longer-distance services on the South West mainline. These improvements would lead to additional peak services between London and locations further afield such as Southampton, Basingstoke, Salisbury, Guildford and Portsmouth.
